Objective of the event: The goal of the event is to introduce the Global Evaluation Initiative (GEI) to both current and potential partners in the African continent as a broad partnership formed to meet the growing demand for the development of monitoring and evaluation capacity. The event will aim to communicate the relevance and timeliness of GEI to the current context, and to focus on the specific challenges of

building M&E capacity across the Africa region along with potential solutions. By bringing together a diverse set of stakeholders, from national policymakers to donors, civil society, and representatives of international organizations, the event will also aim to model the inclusive nature of GEI. With a substantive discussion, featuring a range of perspectives, on the role of monitoring and evaluation in meeting today's policy challenges and the many stakeholders involved in both its development and practice, the event aims to have broad appeal and engage the various constituencies of the GEI partnership.

Format of the event: This will be a 90-minute virtual event on Zoom accessible to all who have registered for the event at:

The event will feature a mix of audience polls, keynote address, moderated discussion and a short, first-person testimonial. The keynote address will set the stage for the ensuing discussions with an overview of the key role of M&E in Africa for coping with the pandemic and reaching the 2030 Agenda. There will be 3 separate moderated discussions focused on GEI, challenges facing M&E development in Africa and the potential role for broad partnerships in overcoming them. The panelists will include founding partners of GEI, a government minister, national government evaluation department representatives, one representative each from a VOPE, donor and international organization, and a first-person testimonial from an independent evaluator. The moderator is an experienced South African broadcast journalist. There will be simultaneous translation into French and Portuguese.

Audience/Outreach: The event is designed for a wide variety of participants, including policy-makers, M&E professionals, civil society, independent evaluators, and international development organizations. Simultaneous translation will make the event more accessible to broader range of audiences.
